

# **The Hard Reality**

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There's no way to sugarcoat it, nor do I have to tell you what you are experiencing first-hand on the farm, this has been the most catastrophic two months in agriculture that any of us have likely ever experienced. If there was any doubt how linked our economy and supply-chains are, we're now finding out in real-time how delicate of a dance our economy truly is.

As the national guidelines and governor mandates began going into effect in mid-March, a chain-reaction began to take place. The closing of restaurants, cafeterias, universities, and schools meant that our largest market had come to a screeching halt, drying up literally overnight. Contracted milk buyers began canceling orders and contracts. There was an immediate oversupply of milk in our country and the likelihood of having to dump milk became a true possibility.

Our Board of Directors acted quickly. On the manufacturing side, we ramped up production at our Ellsworth plant to keep up with the supply by producing barrel cheese at over maximum capacity. In Comstock, we expanded the production schedule to 7 days a week.

On the milk-supply side, the board drafted a letter to communicate the need for urgency in cutting milk production. We requested all members take action to immediately decrease production and offered an incentive to those considering exiting the business in the next year to expedite their plans. The equity buyout offer was made from a place of strength -- thankfully our cooperative was in a strong enough position going into this crisis that we could make the offer.

In the end, I'm happy to report that the majority of patrons took swift action at the farm, cutting milk production. As of this time, no milk has been dumped on our farms or at the creamery.

While it may feel as though we've weathered the worst, it's important to understand the longer term effects we are dealing with and how your milk check will be impacted. The difference in pricing between March and April is quite severe in three major areas:

• First, the lack of fluid milk sales caused a change in our ability to pay for milk by .87/cwt.

- The loss of cheese curd sales and the premium we receive on them resulted in a \$1.12/cwt downward change in the value of milk.
- Inventory will be a minimum of \$1.06/cwt loss because of the decrease in value between months.

This does not take into consideration the entire loss in foodservice artisan cheese sales out of Comstock and processed cheese sales out of New London.

The result is a drastic and dramatic drop on your milk check.

Our production facilities are managing additional concerns. Some things we're keeping a close eye on are:

- Our packaging process will be impacted by a nation-wide shortage of Co2 and packaging film.
- There are delays in receiving supplies and ingredients of all kinds.

#### However we're beginning to see some glimmers of hope.

- We are starting to see small increases in milk sales which is relieving pressure on our production plant.
- The USDA has committed to purchasing 4% of the nation's dairy products via Section 32 and food programs, which has led to commodity prices inching up.
- Foodservice orders have started to trickle in, although we're seeing a boomerang effect with significant swings on the number of orders from week to week.
- Ice cream supplies are in, which is making our retail store customers happy and creating a new revenue stream.

What the coming weeks and months will look like in terms of recovery is anyone's guess. I hope that the Department of Agriculture will continue taking steps to protect and support our nation's farmers and food supply. I am anticipating a continued expanding and contracting over the coming months as businesses open and pull back due to regional outbreaks. We will continue to take steps to ensure the utmost safety and health of our staff and customers.

## **Rich's Little Idea**

A kind gesture by one of our milk haulers, Rich Miller, has turned into just that!

With farmers facing the possibility of having to dump milk, while the dairy aisles in the store were near empty, Rich had an idea. What if donations could be collected from industry partners and the general public and the funds used to purchase cheese curds directly from the producer at a discounted price for local schools and food shelves. Rich put his idea into action and it took off.

It wasn't long after that Rich appeared on a Kare11 News feature. His story inspired other area groups to join in by forming their own similar curd donation initiatives, expanding the program to even more food pantries and schools. So far over \$58,000 over 19,000 pounds —of cheese curds have been purchased at cost with donated funds bringing needed supplies to food pantry shelves and school lunch programs.

#### Shopping Continues at our Retail Stores

In an effort to take extra precautions in keeping our staff safe and our plant sanitary, on March 23 our retail stores made the shift to curbside pickup only. Kudos to our store staff members and marketing team for successfully making the shift.

Customers are able to place their orders over the phone, or by simply driving to our parking lot where they will be greeted in their car by one of our curbside attendants. And while customers continue to show up for their favorite Ellsworth Cooperative Creamery products, we are counting the days to when we can re-open the doors and welcome guests to our stores again.
